## MOVIES IN THE PARK

## ELECTION YEAR

This is election year for Nibley City. Three City Council positions will be open. The term runs for four years. A candidate must have lived in Nibley for one year before next November, be a U.S. citizen and registered voter, and not have a felony conviction. The filing period will be from July 1 until 5:00 p.m. on July 15. Filing forms will be available at the City Office. If more than 6 persons file as candidates, a primary election will be held on September 13 followed by the final election on November 1, 2011.

## DID YOU KNOW:

City Council meetings are held on the first and third Thursday of the month, with occasional special meetings at other times. Citizens are encouraged to participate in the governing of their community.

## MOSQUITO TREATMENT

The Cache Mosquito Abatement District (SMAD) has begun a new season of larvacide treatment and fogging. Fogging in Nibley will be on Wednesday evenings. The schedule may change due to weather conditions. Please check the CMAD website ([www.cachemosquito.com](http://www.cachemosquito.com)) for more information and to note changes to the schedule.

**STORMWATER:** Help us keep our stormwater clean by doing the following:

- Clean up garbage and litter around your home and yard. This will keep it from being washed down stream.
- Keep contaminants out of the rivers and streams by properly disposing of household waste, including cleaners, paints, stains, solvents, automotive fluids, and poisons.
- Wash your car either on your lawn or at a car wash.
- Repair engine fluid leaks as soon as possible.
- Green waste (grass, leaves, hay, straw, branches, shrubs and trees) can be dropped off free of charge at 300 W. 3200 S., across from the park.

**BURN PERMITS:** If you have branches or other materials you would like to burn, you must first get a burn permit from the Cache County Fire Department. To find out burn conditions and when they will issue permits, call 755-1670. Rules to remember for burning: The fire must be out by dark, a water source must be nearby, fires may not be left unattended, and you may be financially responsible for the fire if it gets out of control.
