SURPLUS

GALVANIZED PIPE

Nibley City has used 30-, 36-, and 48-inch galvanized pipe in lengths greater than 10 feet. The pipe may be seen at the city shops. Bids will be accepted until 3:00 p.m. on November 12th at the City Offices.



WINTERIZING IRRIGATION SYSTEMS

When preparing your irrigation systems for winter, shut down the system at the “stop and waste valve.” The valve is usually located on the service line between the water meter and the house. This will release the pressure in the pipes and drain the water from the system to protect components that could freeze.

Once the valve is shut, drain each sprinkler line. Some systems have drain valves that can be opened to release the water. Those without drain valves need to have the water blown out using compressed air.

Finally, if your system is automated, set your electric controller to the “off” position for the winter.

Failure to winterize irrigation systems could result in broken sprinklers and flooded yards.

WINTER PARKING ORDINANCE REMINDER

The overnight parking ban will be in effect between November 1 and April 1 on all city streets.

The ordinance prohibits parking on city roads between the hours of midnight and 6:00 a.m. to ensure that snow plows can keep roads clean and safe. The ban includes all vehicles and trailers. Failure to comply could result in a fine of \$25.

NIBLEY-MILLVILLE FIRST RESPONDERS/SQUAD 140



During the period of July 2010 through August 2010, Nibley-Millville First Responder Emergency Medical Technicians (EMTs) responded to 21 medical emergencies, 15 of which were in Nibley. During that same time, we put in 2,208 hours on-call and worked 184 12-hour shifts. For calendar year 2010, we have responded to a total of 69 medical emergencies of which 46 were in Nibley.

Our squad has added 4 additional EMTs and expects to add an additional EMT in January 2011 bringing our total strength to 12. However, we continue to recruit new members who are committed to serving their communities by providing volunteer pre-hospital emergency care. Applicants must hold a current EMT Basic (or Intermediate/Paramedic) certificate from the Utah Bureau of Emergency Medical Services **OR** be willing to attend and successfully complete an EMT Basic course in Utah. 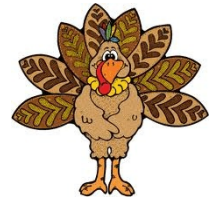
The shipment of bricks has arrived and will be installed in the next week. With Christmas coming, the bricks are a unique (and tax deductible) gift. Call the Library for more information.

Flu shots and flu mist are now available at the Bear River Health Department. Clinics are held Monday through Thursday from 7:30 a.m. - 6:00 p.m. The cost of the shot or mist is \$25. The Department accepts Medicaid, Medicare Part B, Medicare HMO, and Select Health. This year the H1N1 vaccine is part of the seasonal flu vaccine.
