Thoughts From Our Mayor

Dear Nibley Citizens,

HERITAGE DAYS—Thanks for a great Heritage Days! I love that we do this. Thanks to all the volunteers and staff that make this happen every year.

NEW HIGH SCHOOL—Slow down. Consider this a fair warning; we are going to be opening up a new intersection at 2600 South and Hwy 165 in August. We are really worried about the impact of hundreds of new drivers on that intersection and the potential for accidents in front of the new high school. We met with the School District, the City staff, the Sheriff, and the Highway Patrol to talk about managing safety and, as a City, we asked for a couple of things to protect our citizens and our kids:

1. Increased speed and traffic safety patrols on 2600 South, Highway 165, and around Nibley
2. A new traffic light at 2600 South and Highway 165

The upshot is that there will be more police patrols around the City to help people understand the speed limit, the new lights, and the new traffic rules in town. If you pay attention and drive the speed limit, you will be fine. If not, you will get ticketed. We are not out to get you or to raise money but we are out to protect our residents and our kids. Please help us with this.

GENERAL PLAN AND BUDGET REPORT—Thanks for your support in establishing our priorities this year. We took the input that you gave us in our city General Plan process and put those priorities into the budget. This year we will be finishing our new well to provide a safer and more reliable water supply, we will be working on acquiring access to link our parks with a trail system, we will be starting development of the new nature park, and we will be updating our City parks and trails plan. We have also budgeted to start our tennis/pickleball courts and a splash pad this year.

PROPERTY TAX HEARING—Last but not least, we will be having a Truth in Taxation Hearing in August. The City has a practice of maintaining our property tax rate at 0.001667% of property value. Because of the way that the State and the County do their jobs, we periodically have to adjust that tax rate to match our historical practice. That requires us to have a Truth in Taxation hearing because when we maintain a consistent rate, the amount that we collect varies. Historically we've found that when the economy is good, our costs go up under this practice. When the economy is down, our costs go down. By focusing on the rate and not the dollar amount, we've been able to maintain a consistent and sustainable budget that also scales with the growth of the City. So when you see the notice, that's what is going on, and that's why we have the hearing.

I don't know if this is the best way to do this, but it's worked for us for a long time through multiple administrations and until someone comes up with a better system, it's what I'm supporting. If you have time and something to say, please come out and talk to us about it. The hearing will be held on **August 4 at 6:30 p.m.**

Tree Board & Wildlife Association News

The Cache Valley Wildlife Association asks you to remember that the firefly population is very small, and fragile. They are susceptible to changes in moisture as well as light. Unfortunately, people have attempted to capture the fireflies in jars or nets. If even a few dozen of them are captured, the population might never recover and they might quickly be eliminated from our area. Please enjoy their spectacular light show, but please do not harass or capture them.

The Nibley City Tree Board reminds you to watch for upcoming sales on trees and shrubs for Fall planting. Planting trees raises your property value, improves landscaping, provides shade, and produces habitat for beautiful songbirds. You don't have to spend a lot of money buying large trees . . . water, care and time will help the small ones grow and save the budget.

Getting to Know Nibley's Citizens



Nibley resident, Norman Hansen was recently selected as the Utah Hunter Safety Instructor of the Year. We asked Norman about this important honor, what got him involved in hunter safety, and why he feels hunter safety is so important.

Norm said he has always been involved in hunter education. His grandfather took a single shot .22, cut it down, and started him shooting it at age 4. He was taught correct firearm handling from the time he could walk and hunting on the ranch was part of life. He said children in his house were raised with firearms in the house and were taught to respect them. Norm's grandfather also happened to be an instructor.

Norman's good friend and hunter safety instructor, Gene Roskelley, asked for Norm's help with shooting tests when Norm was only in junior high school. The range they used was the old ROTC range on Utah State University's campus. It was divided in 2 by a hallway and Gene would take one half with Norm taking the other. So essentially, Norm was a range officer at age 15.

Norman talked about when his sons took hunter education. He said, "They were always coming home and telling me that they were not learning much as I had already taught them these things. Not long after that, I saw an add in the newspaper stating that there was going to be a class held to teach new instructors and I enrolled."

Norm said that the most important reason most people take hunter education is because of state laws which require hunter education to obtain a hunting license. But on a more personal note, Norm said, "My purpose in teaching is to give back to the sport, which has given me so much enjoyment over the years, and one of my goals is to never read about one of my students being injured in a firearms or hunting accident."

Norm said that firearms safety is just one of the things taught at hunter ed. They also teach hunter ethics, outdoor survival, wildlife conservation, archery and muzzle loading, and water safety. He says everybody should take a hunter ed class and learn how to safely handle a firearm. He has had many women that have married into a hunting family go through one of his classes and he thinks that trend will continue.

Norm said, "I enjoy teaching these classes very much, but I think the big reason I was recognized is because my focus is on the individual student and not numbers. Hunting is my passion, hunter ed is my winter hobby."
