Thoughts From Mayor Dustin

Lessons From Germany–In 1989 I was a Senior in high school and we were living in England where my Dad was stationed with the Air Force. There were 13 of us and we didn't have a lot of money, but my parents did their best to get us cultured while we were over there. Every six months, they would

load us up and take us somewhere "important." On this trip, my Dad found us a place to stay in Germany, and the day after Christmas, we headed for Berlin.


At that time, Berlin was split between East and West. West Berlin was vibrant, with lights and Christmas decorations and music in the street. No one does Christmas like Germany. We also had passes to go to East Berlin, where in contrast, it was grey and quiet with empty sidewalks. The Berlin Wall split the city down the middle. The western side was covered in graffiti, all words and colors. The eastern side was raw grey concrete. The two halves of the city were so different that, even at 17-years-old, I could tell that there was something going on.

The City was in the middle of serious upheaval. Protests ran off and on through December and there was a constant crowd of people at the Brandenberg Gate, carrying signs and chipping at the wall with hammers, chisels, and whatever else happened to be at hand. I remember someone putting a small sledgehammer in my hand. I climbed up to the top and knocked a football sized chunk off the top before handing the hammer off to the next person. An old lady came running out of the crowd, wrapped the concrete in a shawl, and disappeared.

I began to understand the politics and emotions that were going on later that night as I was walking along the wall with my friend Bryan. We came across an old German man working by himself on a lonely section, in the dark. He had a black beret on and a white beard. With a hammer, a chisel, and a hacksaw, he'd made a hole about four feet high and six inches wide in a seam between two panels. I snapped a photo with my camera, and in the flash I saw an East German border guard with his furry hat and rifle on the other side watching the old man work. The old man put down his hammer and reached through the hole to hand the guard a piece of the reinforcing steel.

I love to look at that picture because it reminds me of what happened next. Not with the guard and the old man, but what happened with Germany. The next night was New Years Eve. That night, for all intents, the wall came down and Germany started talking seriously about reunification. The problems were huge. West Germany had the strongest economy in Europe, but the rest of Europe was scared at the potential impact of absorbing millions of poor, economically disadvantaged, culturally separated people. However, the German people were clear in their goals and their desire to take care of their neighbors.

It was expensive. It was hard. But here we are now, less than 30 years later, and Germany is once again the economic engine of Europe. I'd like to think that this is because they had a core value of being united and a belief in the strength of a community working together. That old man reaching out to the guard is an image that will always stick with me.





The Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) program educates volunteers about disaster preparedness for the hazards that may impact their area and trains them in basic disaster response skills, such as fire safety, light search and rescue, team organization, and disaster

medical operations. CERT offers a consistent, nationwide approach to volunteer training and organization that professional responders can rely on during disaster situations, which allows them to focus on more complex tasks.

Serving in Our Community

As Director of the Western Rural Development Center, my husband travels to 13 western states to assist rural communities with economic development. Because of recent technological advances, machines have replaced people in many jobs traditionally held by rural community members. This often results in high rates of unemployment or underemployment in these areas. There are various factors that influence their resiliency during difficult economic times. One of the most important factors is the rate of volunteerism. Rural communities historically produce relatively large numbers of volunteers with individuals doing everything from cleaning the cemeteries to organizing community events. Benefits to the community include higher rates of community satisfaction, a more flexible and resilient economy, higher rates of personal happiness reported by the population, higher quality education and more physically attractive streets, parks, schools etc.

Nibley has a tremendous legacy of volunteerism. The very survival of Nibley's early settlers was dependent on assistance from each other. Every June, we celebrate our heritage. It seems fitting that the success of this celebration is dependent on volunteers. Those volunteer hours are an important tribute to those who have come before us. Indeed a celebration of our heritage that does not reflect hundreds of volunteer hours seems somehow hollow and insincere. The city has organized a number of meaningful opportunities for you to be involved. Some of you volunteered your material goods to help the children in the Little Cypress Mauriceville Independent School District this past December. The generosity of Nibley and other communities was both noted and greatly appreciated. Heritage Elementary School students donated hundreds of books, dozens of back packs and other school supplies. Pollution Prevention

Fertilizer helps things grow but when it gets in water, it helps algae grow. Algae blooms can cause major problems in waterways because they use up oxygen needed by other river critters. Pesticides, intended to kill bugs around our homes, also damage the important ecosystems that live in creeks, rivers, and canals. Additionally, pesticides can cause health threats to humans who play in waterbodies which receive storm water discharge.

Typically, fertilizers and pesticides enter the drainage system in one of three ways:

- 1. They have been stored improperly on the ground and washed into the storm drains by rain.
- 2. They are illegally dumped directly into the drains.
- 3. Most commonly, pollutants enter the storm drain system when they are over-applied to the land surface and then wash into the storm drain by rain.

What can you do to help?

- Fertilize sparingly. Do not fertilize in the Spring until you have mowed the lawn three times.
- Avoid using combination fertilizer/pesticide products. Hand pick weeds when possible, and if you must treat weeds or insects with pesticides, spot treat them rather than dousing the entire lawn.
- Let your grass grow. A general rule of thumb is to never cut more than a third of the the blade of grass. And when you cut it, leave the grass clippings on the lawn. It's the best kind of fertilizer.
- Do not over-water your lawn. Excess water will run off into the street and wash away pesticides and fertilizers before they have had a chance to be effective.
