Winter Parking

Nibley City's winter parking regulations are now in place between November 1 and April 1. Please keep cars off Nibley City streets between the hours of 12:00 a.m. and 6:00 a.m. to avoid a parking ticket.

Winter parking regulations were enacted to keep streets clear should Nibley's Public Works department need to clear the roadways after a storm. This ordinance applies whether or not there is snow on the ground.

If you are ticketed, you are now able to pay the ticket at Nibley City Hall.



Cleaner Street, Cleaner Water—Nibley City's storm drainage system is designed to efficiently carry rain and snowmelt away from our streets and homes. Storm drainage inlets are the grates or openings usually located in the street near the curb. Storm drains ARE



NOT connect to sewage treatment plants, so all storm water, and the litter it carries from the streets, goes strait to our streams, creeks, rivers, and lakes. Liter adds bacteria and nutrients that hurt water quality, damages the environment, and creates unhealthy conditions for animals and humans.

You Can Help!—Please keep trash and debris, automobile fluids, leaf litter and organic matter off the streets. *Remember* . . . *the drain is just for rain* . . . *and sometimes snow*.

Are Public Hearings a Waste of Your Time?



No doubt in the recent past there has been something that has concerned you about Nibley's current or future growth, and rightly so. There have been fair amount of recent changes. Public hearings during a Planning & Zoning Commission (P&Z) or City Council (CC) meetings is

Planning Commissioner one way to explain your civic concerns, grievances, about a specific topic. However, once a public hearing is announced and held, many decisions have already been made. Let me explain.

As a commissioner on the Nibley City P&Z Commission, I absolutely appreciate the passion and thought that goes into comments shared at public hearings. However, there is a piece to this puzzle most citizens do not understand. I didn't fully understand this process until I was in P&Z. I am referring to the creation process of ordinance laws and creation/application of zoning laws.

Here's the school house rocks-style crash course in how an ordinance becomes law: 1) New ordinances or changes to ordinances, and zoning are all discussed/created in P&Z meetings; 2) P&Z makes recommendations to CC concerning the ordinance, zoning, the application of zoning and other civic matters; 3) CC reviews the information, makes changes and votes to approve. Once approved, the ordinance, zoning, or application of zoning is then law.

When a developer wants to build in Nibley they must follow our ordinances and zoning laws. Nibley City must abide by those laws or risk being sued. If sued, we will most likely lose, because we could be breaking the laws we ourselves put into place. The creation/approval of ordinances and application of zoning is far more important than the review/approval of any specific development. To be candid, once a public hearing is held regarding a specific subdivision, conditional use or commercial development, the majority of decisions have already been made as applied by Nibley City's adopted ordinances. The plans can really only be fine tuned at that point.

If you are worried about the possibility of a commercial development in the field behind your home, or more higher density housing being built inside Nibley City boundaries, ordinances and zoning are what truly matters. It is far less exciting than a public hearing about a particular development, but the reality is, these meetings are where the real work gets done. Please join us at our P&Z and CC meetings when we discuss changes to ordinances and zoning. Meeting agendas are always posted at *www.utah.gov/pmn*. Get involved! Nibley is an awesome city, and it is worth fighting for.

Reminders from Nibley City Staff

Nibley's Greenwaste Location

Nibley's green waste dump site at 3390 South 1200 West <u>is</u> now closed. The location will open again in the Spring.

Your must now take your greenwaste, including leaves and tree trimmings, to the Logan City Green Waste facility located at 153 North 1400 West. The Logan facility is open yearround and there is no charge for dropping off greenwaste.

Hunting

It is against the law to discharge a firearm within 600 feet of a residence within Nibley City limits.

Hunting or harassing wildlife is also forbidden on all City property. Ordinance 13-04 prohibits hunting on property owned by Nibley City and states, "Hunting, as defined in §23-13-2, Utah Code Annotated, which shall include hunting with firearms or with bows, each as defined by the laws of the State of Utah, . . . is prohibited on properties owned by Nibley City."

Do Not Push Snow Into the Street

Nibley City's Public Works department does a fantastic job keeping our roads clear and safe during Nibley's snowstorms. Do your part to help them out by not pushing or shoveling snow from your driveway or sidewalks into the street. Keep the snow on your property. Pushing extra snow into the streets is a safety issue and can cause icing problems. There is a State law that prohibits this. The law states: *"It is unlawful for any person to place snow from a driveway onto any road or highway which interferes with the normal use or creates a safety hazard."*

Other snow reminders:

Don't allow children to make snow forts in snow piles at the edge of the road or in a park strip. If roads are to be plowed, the snow must be pushed to the side of the road. If you have a neigh-



bor who is unable to remove the snow from their driveway or in front of their mail boxes, please assist them.

Remember to clear their sidewalks within a reasonable time after a snow or ice event. -Nibley City Staff

Recycling Do's and Don'ts

Most homes do their best to recycle only the things that should be placed in the blue recycling container, but Logan Environmental is still seeing more contamination than they would like. To the left is a graphic detailing what is accepted. Please make every effort reduce contamination and divert waste from the landfill by ensuring you are only placing appropriate items in your recycle can.

Please do not put garbage or green waste into the recycling cans. If you find that you need extra garbage capacity, please call 716-9755. Logan Environmental is happy to help you with adding additional garbage containers.
