Mayor Jacobsen's Message



This month's newsletter focuses on some of the favorite members of our families and community: the ones with fur, hair, and feathers. Look at these "kids" that live in the pasture behind our house. How can you not like these guys? Could they ever not be welcomed by everyone in the neighborhood? The answer is, yes. If left to their own devices, these goats could cause big problems. For example, if they escaped from the pasture and

started munching on our neighbors' flowers and trees, they (along with Becky and me) would be in trouble. Although this gang of goats keep each other company most of the time, when one goat can't find the others, they make noise calling for their buddies. Becky and I don't like to remember the small, neutered, male goat (called a wether) that somehow grew up to act (and smell) like an unwethered male goat, despite the veterinary procedure that should have taken care of that. We had to find a new home with far away neighbors for that goat. I mentioned in the February 2024 newsletter that a citizen committee, along with the Nibley Planning Commission and City Council, worked last year to overhaul the city ordinance that regulates animals. It is a difficult task to make rules about the animals that we keep and include as members of our families. David Church, retired legal counsel for the Utah League of Cities and Towns used to talk about how coercive (bossy) local governments are. They make rules about the size, setbacks, and frontage of the lot where you live, the maximum height of your house, the number of outbuildings you can have, and even how many dogs you can have! No doubt, we give up some individual rights when we choose to live in a community.

Rules don't stop at pets. As a community, we make rules that set expectations about how to be a good neighbor, and it can be a challenge to decide the specific rules that draw the line between your rights and the rights of your neighbors. Things often look different from two different sides of a property line. With a commitment to a healthy and orderly community, the Nibley City Council, myself included, have asked staff to enforce the city's ordinances for years. Lately, it seems there is increased frustration from individuals who feel wronged by the process that enforces our code. I understand that frustration, and I hope you understand that the council's goal is to find the right code that will help us live together in the same community. If we have the incorrect code, there is a way to remedy that. Please let me, or any other council member, know where you feel wronged by Nibley's existing code. The open-forum public comment period at the beginning of each council meeting is a good place to initiate a process that could lead to a policy discussion and possible ordinance

How to Register/Renew:

- New dog licenses can be processed at any time through the Nibley City website nibleycity.gov → Citizens → Dog Licensing.
- If you already have a current license, you will receive an email with a link to renew it online via Civic Review.

Important Dates:

- Current dog licenses expire on February 28th.
- Renewal period: You can renew your dog's license now through February 28, 2025, to receive early-bird pricing, which includes a \$10 discount.

Requirements:

• Proof of current rabies vaccination is required for registration.

Dogs in Parks

As a reminder, Nibley City Parks ordinance allows for dogs on a leash in our parks. However, there are a few places where even leashed dogs are NOT allowed:

- 1. Firefly park (a nature park west of Virgil Gibbons Heritage Park). We do NOT allow dogs even if they are on a leash to help preserve the wildlife in the nature park, especially migratory birds, including but not limited to ground nesting birds.
- 2. On designated sports fields and courts. Players, parents, and coaches do NOT want to play on athletic fields with dog waste or urine. Even if the dog owner cleans up the mess on a sports field or court, dogs naturally want to go where another dog has "marked" the field.

We appreciate responsible dog owners that clean up after their pet(s) and follow our rules and laws but if you see community members violating our parks ordinance, please report it immediately to Cache County Animal Control (753-7555). We encourage you to get out and about in our community and at our parks with your dog.

Your Input is Needed!—Public Meeting



The Utah Department of Transportation (UDOT), in partnership with Cache County and local municipalities, is evaluating improvements to enhance mobility on US-89/91 (Logan Main Street).

The study area includes US-89/91, adjacent state routes and local roadways with the goal of identifying potential traffic and non-motorized solutions for the community.

You are invited to a public meeting to review the recommended improvements for the corridor and provide feedback to the study team.

When: Tuesday, Feb. 25, from 4:30–6:30 p.m. Where: Mount Logan Middle School 875 North 200 East Logan, UT 84321

If you cannot attend the in-person meeting, please visit *udotinput.utah.gov/us91study* to learn more about the recommended improvements and provide feedback. The public comment period is open from Tuesday, February 18, through Tuesday, March 18.

From Cache County Animal Control

The Cache County Sheriff's Animal Services reminds us that a license attached to a dog's collar allows Animal Control to return your pet to your home quickly without the animal being impounded at the shelter.

When winter temperatures go below 32° small dogs and short coat breeds are particularly susceptible to colder weather. It is advised that these animals have access to a shelter that is insulated and off the ground or be outside no longer than 30 minutes.

Animal Control currently does not respond to calls involving feral cats unless the animal is sick, injured, or was involved in a bite on a human being. Traps are available as a self service option, if available.

Finally, if you suspect torture of an animal, or animal abuse, please contact dispatch at 435-753-7555.

change at a future meeting. The Utah Open Public Meetings Act (a great piece of State code, in my opinion) does not allow the council to discuss policy without giving notice to the public of that discussion. Therefore, this open forum can be a good place to start, but not finish, the discussion. I, and other council members, are committed to being accessible to the citizens of Nibley. That accessibility does not guarantee a code change will result, but it does guarantee we will hear your point of view.

Be "In The Know"

"The Utah Public Notice Website is dedicated to bringing greater accessibility to public notice information and increased participation by the public. It is a central source for all public notice information statewide, provided in a standardized format for publishing. It allows the public to subscribe by email to a Body to receive its notices and updates. . . . Public notice informs members of the general public of government or government-related activities which may concern their local area, municipality, county, or state."

If you'd like to be "in the know" of everything being discussed and decided by any of our Nibley City public bodies, including the Nibley City Council, you are encouraged to go to the Utah Public Notice website and sign up for notifications. If you do this, you'll receive an email and a link each time an agenda is posted for the public body discussion(s) you are interested in.

To sign up for notifications go to *Utah.gov/pmn/* or search for Utah Public Notice in your favorite web browser. Then, scroll down to "*Browse for Notices*" and click on "*Municipality*", "*Nibley City*", and then the public body you would like to receive notices for. Once you find the public body you are interested in, you click on it and will be taken to a list of that body's notices, both past and future. If you click on one of the notices you'll see a blue button that reads "*Subscribe to Public Body*" and you be prompted to enter your name and email address. Voila! That's it. You'll be notified of the public body's meetings and even changes to a meeting agenda.


SUPER STARTt Soccer & T-ball—SUPER STARt pro-


